SILENCE (2012)

Directed by: Pat Collins

Eoghan is a sound recordist returning to Ireland for the first time in 15 years, being employed to find and record silence in places away from manmade sound. He is as quiet as the places he seeks (sound recordists must learn to breathe softly). As he journeys across Ireland, characters are content to appear, share a few moments of dialogue, and disappear. The ephemerality of their presence throughout the film *Silence* denies the development of a character driven narrative (except perhaps Eoghan's own development, though his introverted nature makes that, too, undramatic in a nice kind of way).

The sound design is curious and shifting. All sound arrives to us with a sense of place, but whether they belong to the place we see or from someplace elsewhere is uncertain. Muffled voices and windy murmurs disguise themselves as diegetic sound only to continue when the scene changes, or fade away as the protagonist leaves the shot. The film

is heavy with sonic remnants of memories that we are not privy to.

Alongside the quietly exceptional sound design, the cinematography is also stunning. Long, still frame shots of windy Irish moors, overgrown woods and lonely harbours are unassumingly beautiful.

My favourite aspect of the film is the gentle questioning of the relationship between place, sound, and time. The sound of Eoghan's past and present are seemingly at once, the playback of the places he's recorded are relocated and remembered, archival audio is revived, the sounds of our own realities are heightened (impossible to ignore the chatter of White Gum Valley suburbia while I watch the near silent film in the living room), and the beauty of these mundane murmurs are reaffirmed in the quiet of it all. This is a film for those who like to listen.
